A Mountain Before Breakfast/£7.00

Alan's first book , *Moonwalker*, is a unique story, the memoir of a man whose love of Scotland's mountains would override his body-clock and all conventional notions of health and safety, ascending mountains in

the middle of the night, seeing the sun rise and then coming down the mountain as everyone else was going up. In his follow-up, A Mountain Before Breakfast, fresh from seven years of nocturnal peak-bagging in Moonwalker, Alan now has his sights set on a new mountain list, the Corbetts. Cue more midnight dashes across the country and more tales of madness and mayhem - car crashes, roads that don't exist, wild pigs and staring goats, the temporary loss of both feet, supermodel posties, giant chickens and snake-infested hillsides.

Alan Rowan is a mountaineer, journalist and author. He has climbed the Munros three times, the Corbetts and all the 3000-foot peaks in England, Ireland and Wales, many of them during the wee, small hours – often after finishing his shifts at a national newspaper at midnight. He is currently closing in on a fourth round of Munros as well as ticking off the Grahams and Donalds



Alan is from Dundee and has worked on national newspapers all over Scotland for more than 30 years. He continues to write for a variety of outlets including outdoor publications.



LITERACY - Blairgowrie High School Art and Photography Exhibition



This year we are branching out with our exhibition space and curating 2 shows for the festival with photography work located at the Book Festival venue, Blairgowrie Community Campus, and a school based Art exhibition at Blairgowrie High School. 

18.00 - 19.00 Christopher Brookmyre *Want You Gone*/£7.00

Chris Brookmyre discusses the follow-up to 2016's McIlvanney Prize winner *Black Widow*, in which journalist Jack Parlabane is blackmailed by a skilled, resourceful and boundlessly devious hacker.

Chris Brookmyre's first novel, *Quite Ugly One Morning*, won the First

Blood Award in 1996 for the best first crime novel of the year. Eighteen further novels garnered him two Sherlock awards and the Bollinger Everyman Wodehouse Prize for Comic Writing. In 2005 he was named Glasgow University Young Alumnus of the Year and in 2007 won the Glenfiddich Spirit of Scotland Award for writing. In 2016 his novel Black Widow won the inaugural McIlvanney Prize for best Scottish crime novel of the year.

This is about how we tell the story of our lives, and our capacity for love. Richly woven through with art and

music, this book is filled with emotional depth, eloquence and wisdom.

Rachel Crowther worked as a doctor in the NHS for twenty years before succumbing to a lifelong yearning to write fiction.

She has an MA in Creative Writing and a string of



prizes for her short fiction. Her first novel, *The Partridge and the Pelican*, a Tatler 'sizzling summer read', was published in 2011, and The Things You Do For Love followed in 2016.



Rachel will also introduce her new novel due out this summer, *Every Secret Thing*, a tale of friendship, betrayal and second chances.

10.00 - 11.00 Martin Bell OBE War and The Death of News/£7.00

Martin Bell has spent more than half a century in unquiet corners of the world, including the surrogate war zone of the House of Commons. During that time, the way that wars have been fought and perceived, and the way that news has been gathered and presented has changed radically. From Vietnam to

Bosnia and beyond, this is a moving, personal account of war, with an impassioned call to put the substance back into our news.

From the ranks of the Suffolk Regiment, Martin Bell emerged to become one of the BBC's best-known war reporters. He covered conflicts from Vietnam to Bosnia, where he was wounded. In 1997 he became the first elected Independent MP for 50 years. He is now an Ambassador for UNICEF and an author. His eight books include one of poetry. He had a chrysanthemum named after him at the Chelsea Flower Show in 2014.

11.30 - 12.30 Lin Anderson Follow the Dead - Silence the Living/£7.00

Forensic scientist Dr Rhona MacLeod joins a mountain rescue team on Cairngorm summit. A mysterious plane has crash landed on frozen Loch A'an.

A nearby climbing expedition has left three young people dead and a fourth missing after having seen Am Fear Liath Mòr, the Big Grey Man who haunts the


mountain. Rhona is joined by the enigmatic Norwegian detective Alvis Olsen with disturbing theories about the link to his homeland.

Lin Anderson has published twelve novels featuring forensic expert Dr Rhona MacLeod, the latest, published August 2017, being Follow the Dead. Her first feature film script, *Sometime Did Me Seek* is due to shoot in Edinburgh shortly. Her short film *River Child* won a student BAFTA and the Celtic Film Festival best fiction award. Lin is co-founder of the crime writing festival, Bloody Scotland.

Powerful, challenging and very funny, Billionaires' Banquet is an immorality tale for the 21st century.

With an international reputation as a prizewinning novelist, Ron Butlin is a former Edinburgh Makar / Poet Laureate. His twenty books have won many prizes and been translated into over a dozen languages. His previous novel, *Ghost Moon*, was nominated for the international IMPAC Prize 2016. His latest novel Billionaires' Banquet was published in April this year.

Currently establishing her own bakery, she is also presenting on BBC radio, and writing a regular food column for a national newspaper.


A gathering is an easy way of cooking and hosting. It means no pressure, no code of conduct, and everyone - cook included - can actually enjoy themselves.

Alan Johnson continues to chart his extraordinary journey from the slums of West London to the corridors of power in Westminster, a journey almost unimaginable in today's Britain.

In The Long and Winding Road, Alan's characteristic honesty and authenticity shine through every word. His book takes you into a world which is at once familiar and strange: this is politics as you've never seen it before.....

Alan was chosen to stand in the constituency of Hull West and Hessle, and entered Parliament as an MP in May 1997. Rising through various Ministerial positions he became Home Secretary in 2009.

His first book, *This Boy*, won the RSL Ondaatje prize and the Orwell Prize in 2013. His second, *Please Mister Postman*, won the National Book Award for Autobiography of the Year in 2014.

Following on from last year's success with the ever-popular Whisky Galore - The Radio Play, this year's festival play will be a premiere, The Arrow,

by local playwright, Robert Mercer Nairne from Meikleour.

The arrow in question is made of silver and was presented to the people of Rattray in the 17th century to commemorate an archery contest. Last competed for in 1727, the arrow has been in the custody of the Mercer Nairne family ever since. Controversy raged locally some years ago when the arrow, which is worth tens of thousands of pounds, was put up for auction in London. On finding this out, local people protested vehemently and it was withdrawn. Ownership of the arrow has been hotly contested ever since.

The play explores the controversial history surrounding the arrow and the fate of the last winner.
